St Patrick's Roman Catholic Hall was built as a church in 1942. The simple building of weatherboard and fibro is now used as a church hall.

It is of historic and social significance to the local Portarlington community.

St Patrick's Roman Catholic Hall represents the significant religious and social influence of the denomination's adherents in Portarlington and surrounds. It was built some years after the original St Patrick's church (not on this site) was demolished. Probably intended as a temporary church building when it was constructed, the building became a hall when a new church building was opened in 1966, the third in the denomination's history in Portarlington.

It is of LOCAL cultural significance.

Physical Description 1

Sited on a large open corner block that is part of the Catholic Church grounds. It was built in 1942 after the original brick church was demolished. The unusual timber framed, weatherboard and fibro clad building has a rectangular plan and a gable roof, clad in corrugated iron, running east-west.

The east elevation has plain bargeboards on the gable ends, a small 'oriental' style corrugated iron hood over the entrance door, two narrow rectangular windows either side of the timber door, and a rectangular louvered vent as gable decoration. The north elevation has five regularly arranged and rectangular windows with diamond shaped leadlighting.
