What is significant?

The site is significant because it shows two different methods of alluvial mining - use of a puddling machine and ground sluicing. The site also demonstrates the importance of water.

How is it significant?

The site has significance because of its:

Intactness: retains evidence of the key aspects of two forms of alluvial mining – the remain of a puddling machine and a sluice pit

Integrity: a compact arrangement of mining relics which demonstrates the basic outlay of two forms of alluvial mining.

Condition: retained fabric in a condition that can be understood and interpreted

Why is it significant?

Site is significant due to its association with the mining technologies that were used during and after the gold rush.

History

Long Gully would have been opened during the great Maryborough Rush in the mid 1850s. After the gully was worked-out it would have been taken over by the puddlers and quartz miners. Relics recorded would most probably date to the mid to late nineteenth century.
