Early major engineering works to establish Anthony's Cutting and the approaches to the Djerriwarrh Bridge in 1858-9, enabling a descent down the steep escarpment into Bacchus Marsh, on the Ballarat Road route to the gold fields.

The site is oflocal historical significance in demonstrating the effect of government action on development of the Bacchus Marsh community and on the route to Ballarat and the gold fields, hence influential on the development of this place and others along the route of the road and as being a pioneering engineering achievement.

It is also oflocal social significance as a landmark, used by the community for orientation.

Remnants offormer road alignments survive beside present freeway. These have evidence of cuttings, embankments and former road surfaces, and are believed to date from the 1950s realignment, earlier earthworks, having buried or destroyed by the later construction. An exception to this is the approaches to the Djerriwarrh Creek Bridge (ref 351), which probably relate to the original construction of the road in 1858-9, although it would have been re-metalled several times.
