GEORGE GRAVES AND THOMAS FRAZER BUILT A WINTER MILL IN THE HEADWATERS OF PINCHGUT CREEK IN 1864. WITH A 30HP ENGINE, THE MILL CUT AROUND 8500 SUPERFEET PER DAY. A SMALL SETTLEMENT GREW UP NEARBY TO HOUSE THE MILL WORKERS WITH LINKS TO THE ANDERSON BROTHERS' OPERATION AT BARKSTEAD. THE MILL WAS BURNT DOWN IN 1868 BU REBUILT. GRAVES LEFT THE PARTNERSHIP IN 1879. THE MILL BURNT DOWN AGAIN IN 1881 AND THE SITE WAS ABANDONED.
