## **Physical Description 1**

Commemorative planting of Populus x canadensis 'Robusta' (Hybrid Black Poplar) to honour residents of the area who served in the WW1. Recent plantings to fill the gaps are a different cultivar (Populus dectoides). 123 trees.

It begins opposite Akoonah Park and continues to 111 High Street (Princes Highway) Berwick. It is clearly marked with signs at each end indicating that it is a World War 1 Memorial.

Sign posted: Berwick Beaconsfield Memorial Avenue 1914 - 1918 War.

## **Veterans Description for Public**

The Berwick Grammar School Honour Avenue was planted on June 15th 1919 to commemorate the lives of former pupils who died serving in the First World War. The Avenue was planted by 50 Grammaroldboys and consists of seven Oak trees (*Quercus palustris, Quercus robur*) located on the west side of Church Street, between Palmerston and Brisbane streets. The trees remain in excellent condition.

Outside the former Grammar Schoolbuilding (now a private residence) is a small tablet listing the names of the boys who died serving: E. D'A Brunn, H.O. Elmes, E.G. Gaunt, S.Hodgson, H.I. Hope, A.E. Kent, C.H. Lyon, A.H. Miller and A.M. Robin.
