COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS

While Norfolk Island Pines of this age are relatively common in the Shire, a tree planted as a 'Peace Tree' in the aftermath of war is rare. It does compare, however, to the individual trees that make up the various avenues of honour planted around this same time.
