What is significant?

The memorial gates and monument outside Naringal Public Hall were installed after World War I. The hall is situated on the Cobden-Warrnambool Road at Narringal.

How is it significant?

The memorial gates and monument outside Naringal Public Hall are of historical, aesthetic and social significance to Moyne Shire.

Why is it significant?

The memorial gates and monument outside Naringal Public Hall are of local historical significance as a memorial to the local soldiers who died in the First World War.

The memorial gates and monument outside Naringal Public Hall are of local aesthetic significance for their simple form.

The memorial gates and monument outside Naringal Public Hall are of local social significance as a local memorial, and therefore a place of pilgrimage and remembrance for the local community.

Memorial gates and monument installed outside the Narringal public hall, which is situated on the Cobden-Warrnambool Road at Narringal.

COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS

The memorial gates at Narringal public hall which were erected to honour local soldiers who served in world wars is a modest and utilitarian memorial compared to the other typical stone memorials popular after the First World War. Other memorial gates were installed at public sites elsewhere in the Shire . . . for example at Woorndoo recreation reserve (1945). There were also memorial gates installed at Koroit Botanic Gardens in the early 1930s and at the Mortlake (D.C. Farran) recreation reserve in 1940, although these examples do not honour fallen soldiers.

The Naringal Memorial Gates and Monument outside Naringal Public Hall, on the Cobden-Warrnambool Road, were installed to honour local soldiers who served in the First World War. Other memorial gates were installed at public sites elsewhere in the Shire for example at Woorndoo recreation reserve (1945).
