## Statement of Significance

Last updated on - May 8, 2006

The site has unknown significance, as it has not been established whether it is a small quarry, a well, or an enlarged spring. It is a man-made feature, relating to the early European settlement of this area.

Archaeological Significance	The feature may contain archaeological deposits which can be used to clarify its purpose or provide a date for its creation/use. This would certainly be the case in the event that the feature turns out to be a filled well.
Historical Significance	Although of unclear purpose, the feature would appear to be anthropomorphic, and it probably therefore relates to the previous agricultural or industrial use of the property.

The site has been interpreted as possibly a small quarry, a spring enlarged for use as a small dam, or a well.

Interpretation of  
Site

The previous site card (2006) recorded the feature as filled with waterlogged grass and recommended that it be excavated to determine its function. Some material has evidently been removed since this time, but the site was largely overgrown at the time of survey and its nature remains unclear.

## History

The site lies with former Section B, Partition 4, parish of Yan Yean. Thomas L M Winter was the original purchaser. By 1853, the Nelson family owned land between Plenty Road and Yan Yean Road. The land was later purchased by Maurice and Frederick Bassett during the 1880s/90s. The Bassetts were, amongst other things, dairy farmers. The property has been owned by Charlie Farrugia since the late 1970s. There is no oral history relating to this feature.
