STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Alexander Shanks & Son diesel engine and pump house at "Tomara", 1732-1770 Barwon Heads Road, is a historically significant at a REGIONAL level. It is associated with the asparagus farm operated by George and Walter Foster for the Australian Jam Company from the early 1920s. The pump house at "Tomara", 1732-1770 Barwon Heads Road, is socially significant at a REGIONAL level. It represents part of the operations of the former asparagus farm no longer in use, yet still recognised by the community for these associations. The Alexander Shanks & Son diesel engine at "Tomara", 1732-1770 Barwon Heads Road, is scientifically significant at a STATE level. The engine is a legacy of the technological process developed for reticulating water throughout a network of underground concrete pipes, as part of the asparagus farming operations. Overall, the pump house at Tomara, 1732-1770 Barwon Heads Road, is of REGIONAL significance.

Physical Description 1

An Alexander Shanks & Son Ltd (engineers, Arbroath and London) diesel engine that once pumped water from the freshwater lagoon (that formed part of the Murtna Ghurt Swamp) is located within a galvanised corrugated iron interwar vernacular pump house, characterised by a gable roof form. The shed consists of a timber structural frame and has remnants of timber framed windows and doors to three sides. The fourth side has a long, narrow projecting wing which formed part of the pumping operations.
