'Tooronga', reputedly built c 1856 for John Dennis, produce merchant, is an interesting early victorian era town house, erected in the most prestigious residential area of era 1850-80 and centred on Latrobe Terrace. The history of this structure and its occupants remains virtually unrecorded. The design is reminiscent of Colonial Regency architecture of the 1840's. The unusually detailed decorated timber verandah and upper floor balustrade is the most distinctive feature of this building, which was used by A.W. Kearney as his 'University School' in the 1880's.
