STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Pakington Village is the former Miller homes, designed in 1909-10 by the architect William Cleverdon for the Trustees of Alexander Miller. The homes have been extended and converted into a shopping complex. It is of local significance.

Physical Description 1

DESCRIPTION

The single storey building has a series of hipped roofs with gables at each end of the front facade. In the center is an octagonal tower with a steeply pitched roof on either side of this is bull-nosed verandahs. Tall chimneys project from the rear of the building. Decorative elements include the red brickwork with contrasting window joinery, tympanums, stringcourses and corbels, although recently this effect has been obscured by all the elements being painted a dark brown. The cast iron verandah decoration is geometric in design and is more common on buildings built prior to 1900.
