The two storey brick residence "Ariston" in Pakington Street, Newtown was built in 1891 for mining company entrepreneur and investor, James Randell, to eclectic style design by young Melbourne Architect, Phillip A Kennedy. The ten room Villa is dominated by an elaborate cast iron balcony, verandah and iron fence in a style

derived from the English late Victorian Aesthetic Movement. Randell.
