STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE - GRC (Historic Places Documentation Sheet)

The terrace pair of two storey houses known as 'Jesmond and Arlston' (formerly 'Benton') were erected in 1880 for Ward Nicholson, part proprietor of the Vulcan Foundry, Geelong's long established iron foundry. This distinctive and elaborately enhanced terrace pair, with finely detailed cast iron balcony, cement render mouldings and interior is an important example of the terrace house in Geelong, with detailing characteristics of the work of Architect, Alexander Davidson, a close friend of foundry-man Ward Nicholson and possibly the architect for this exceptional semi-detached pair.

Largely intact, substantial and distinctive pair. 2 storey, tuck pointed bi-chrome brick with basalt plinth, hipped roof clad in slate with metal cresting to no. 32, cast iron balcony, elaborate brick chimneys with terracotta pots, timber brackets to eaves. 2 storey verandah with timber framed cast iron frieze & balustrade, round columns with capitals, timber dentillated moulding, lower decks tiled with basalt edge, basalt stairs. Openings have rendered architraves, timber sash windows with leadlight highlights, French doors to upper level of no.34, 6 panelled timber doors to arched entry with leadlight highlight & sidelights. Original cast iron palisade fence (Humble & Nicholson, Geelong) with basalt plinth.
