St. Edmund he was brought up a Christian and became king of East Anglia. Despite resisting mightily the invasion of the Vikings from Europe in 869-70, he was defeated and captured. It is believed that he was shot to death with arrows, hence the depiction of an arrow in his hand, as well as the sword denoting his fighting spirit and crown, symbol of his reign.

This, with two other small narrow windows in the sanctuary [not illustrated], are listed on the Chapel's guide to the windows and memorials as 'Windows in Memory of Medical and Dental Personnel'. The window was one of the many designed by David Taylor Kellocj (1913-1988) for the chapel designed by architect, Louis R. Williams. They were installed in stages after 1954. Kellock, an Edingurgh-trained stained glass artist, immigrated to Australia prior to the Second World War.
