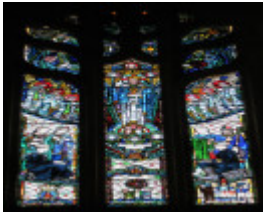

Memorial Window Description & History

The three-light memorial to HMAS *Sydney* was one of several important windows installed when the new Royal Australian Navy Chapel was dedicated by the Archbishop of Melbourne and declared open by the Governor of Victoria on 15 May 1954. It was designed by stained glass artist David Taylor Kellock (1913-1988) as a major feature of the west end of the Chapel. *Christ in Glory* filled the major portion of the central light, attended by cherubim and seraphin, with sweeps of Angels in the flanking lights. The insignia of HMAS *Sydney* was pictured in the base of the left-hand base and the coat of arms of the City of Sydney in the right-hand light. Placed prominently in the outer lights were representative figures of the men (left) and officers (right), kneeling in homage to Christ and overlooked by bishops, apostles and prophets of the Christ on earth. The tracery at the head of the windows was filled with symbols of the church (Alpha and Omega) and of the Navy (Southern Cross, rope and libebuoy) and others that intertwinewith them(stars, the Southern Cross, a lighthouse) in a deep and effective sea-like background.
