STATEMENT OF SIGNFICANCE

Historically, there appears to be a long association with the John L.Gibson, a COlac grazier, and hence this may provide a link to Geelongs woolgrowing foundation. Architecturally, the house is an early and successful example of the Queen Anne revival style and an important, streetscape element (see also 17 Pevensey Crescent.)

External Integrity:

A major detraction to this very visible building is the verandah enclosure on the north and east fences. The fence may have been altered in detail.

STREETSCAPE:

Because of its corner site and relatively large scale, the house is a major element in the Edwardian and Victorian era residential streetscape, also contributory to a similar precinct (3.7).

Description

A large two storey English Queen Anne styled red brick villa, the house has the style typical half timbered roof gables, bracketed window hoods and timber verandah detailing. The chimney cornices are also pedimented. At

the rear of the house is an extensive servants wing, around the perimeter, a capped corrugated iron fence and, within the grounds, mature exotic landscape.

Physical Description 2

Largely intact, substantial 2 storey Queen Anne style house, red brick, hipped & gable roof clad in slate with metal dormer vent, timber brackets to eaves, roughcast & decorative timber battens & finial to gable end, 2 storey verandah with decorative timber friezes & balustrade, timber sash windows with hood to gabled section & rendered swags & pediment above ground level windows, brick chimney with rendered details, later garage to side.
