Interpretation of Site	Timber residence. Centre weatherboard section built in c.1845, with the rear section constructed after this date. Front section, possibly prefabricated, was built in 1853 (Nat. Trust File B1633 - Statement of Significance).
Archaeological Significance	The site is archaeologically significant as it has the potential to contain intact occupation deposits dating to earliest settlement of Port Fairy.
Historical Significance	The cottage is historically significant as one of the oldest buildings in Victoria, relating to the earliest settlement of Port Fairy.

History

Reportedly built by Captain John Mills in c.1845. John Mills was the harbourmaster at Port Fairy from 1853 to 1871. He lived in the house from the mid 1850s to 1871 (his brother, Charles, first occupied the house). The Mills family sold the property in 1909.
