Statement of significance

The ship is historically significant as example of an early inter-colonial trader, and for its association with the mass immigration to the Victorian goldfields. The archaeological significance is unlikely to be high, as the ship suffered severe fire damage

VHR history

Some of the crew had deserted to the goldfields and were suspected of starting the fire which was discovered during the night by the Captain who sounded the alarm and found the crew gone. The boats of the Electra and the Water Police gave assistance and the ship was towed towards the beach and scuttled under the direction of the Deputy Harbour Master. Although there was little wind, the fire burned so furiously that destruction of the ship was complete.
