Statement of significance

The vessel is historically significant as a representation of a steam ship coastal trader of the 19th century.

VHR history

While at anchor at Corner Inlet in Bentley's Harbour, Gippsland the paddle steamer Albert Victor was destroyed by fire 3 February 1889. The vessel had previously put in to deliver cargo. The vessel was completely gutted and the hull sank in 4 fathoms of water after remaining afloat for 18 hours. The Captain and crew were already onshore, but the engineer, who was asleep below woke to smoke and flames, jumped overboard and swam to shore. The crew made their way to Snake Island where their signals were seen by the steamer SS Maitland, from Melbourne, and the crew were brought to Port Albert. The cause of the fire was unknown.
