Statement of significance

<p>The County Antrim is significant as an example of an inbound international shipwreck. It was one of the last international ships to be lost on the Gippsland coast.</p>

VHR history

The COUNTY ANTRIM was on a voyage from Maryport to Brisbane with a cargo of rails. The ship was proceeding up the coast when it was struck by a severe gale on 10-11 Jan. The cargo in the after hold shifted and in the attempt to resecure it, the Mate and 4 of the crew were injured. The vessel began to leak so the captain decided to run it ashore. The Marine Board of Inquiry was critical of this course of action and suspended his certificate for six months.
 The County Antrim was one of the last international sailing vessels to be lost on the Gippsland coast.
