Statement of significance

The Dunedin is historically significant for its association with international trade into Port Phillip, with possible associations with the goldrushes.

VHR history

Formerly of London, bought for intercolonial trade and renamed in 1858. On her first voyage from London to Dunedin, completed in a quick 84 days, there were four future NZ politicians on board (Ferguson, Don,

unpublished notes on the Dunedin) In late 1850s, traded in Bay and between Melbourne and Adelaide. On one voyage to Otago in 1861, four stowaways were landed at Shortlands Bluff [possibly gold seekers]. Had arrived from Bluff Harbour, Otago, NZ with 5 passengers on 9 Dec. 1863. Became a total wreck, although initially thought to be little damaged. Register closed 31 Dec. 1863.
