VHR history

The cutter Eagle, a wooden vessel was stranded at Rye on 23 June 1882. Bought by Frank Arthur Harris of Fitzroy on 29 July 1882, subsequently got off and sold to H.J. Wilson who salvaged it. Re-registered under the same name. The Eagle ferried between Williamstown and Yarra in 1856. In 1862 it was purchased by Peter Huddart, presumably to distribute coal (UID 2) and in 1877 was regularly docking in Yarra (voyages not known). The ship went ashore at Rosebud in 1883
