Statement of significance

<p>It is impossible to assess the archaeological significance of the Eleonora as the site has not been located. As it was involved in the early development of Apollo Bay and the timber industry it has local historical significance.</p>

VHR history

The two masted brigantine Eleonora was built in Cincinatti, Ohio in 1847. It was registered in the Port of Melbourne at the time of its loss. It had probably come out from the United States with gold seekers, and was seeking employment where it could be found, in this case carrying railway sleepers from Apollo Bay to Geelong for the Geelong to Ballarat railway. On 31 December 1856 while waiting in the Apollo Bay anchorage to load sleepers it was blown ashore in the same gale as the Christian. Some sources mention that another vessel the Achilles was blown ashore in the same gale but this has not been substantiated. Its Registry was closed on 27 February 1857.
 There are a number of spellings used variously for the name of this vessel.
