Cause of loss

Riding at single anchor with 35 fathoms of chain, parted cable in the gale. Second anchor let go, but it also parted. Before the third anchor, a patent one could be got ready, the barque drove on to Emerald Hill (Sth Melbourne) shore, close to baths. While drifting over the sandspit, the rudder was carried away. The Captain got the hatches off & amp; allowed the hold to fill up preventing vessel from rolling. Frowning Beauty was impossible to refloat, and was broken up (UID 9, 52, Peter Taylor)

Statement of significance

The Frowning Beauty is historically significant for its association with intercolonial coal trade

VHR history

Had finished discharging cargo and ballasting at Ann St Pier, Williamstown. Rode storm with 35 fathoms of chain until cable parted. Second anchor parted, barque driven across Bay onto shore close to Emerald Hill baths, over sandbank, carrying away rudder. Stranded high and dry but attempts to refloat unsuccessful. Broken up some months later, although registration not cancelled until 1917. Marine Board Inquiry found the vessel had deficient tackle for its size (according to Lloyd's rules) but had no power to reach Newcastle owner for culpable neglect. Master exonerated from all blame. Frowning Beauty a regular coal carrier from Newcastle to Melbourne. The Captain reported that his mate could be blamed for the loss of the ship, as he had intended to go directly to sea, but the mate was not aboard, and was found "the worse for liquor" (ID 9)
