### **Statement of significance**

<p>It is difficult to assess the significance of this site as it has not been located nor inspected.</p>

### **VHR history**

After a heavy Rip swell dumped Aguna on rocks in visibility of 5 ft, the three fishermen made for the side as vessel broke its back and sank. Wave swept them onto reef. John Keys (28) and Norman Robertson (32) of Warrandyte, and Jim Shea of Williamstown (21) (Sun says Bridport, Tasmania) waded by compass in dense fog 250 yards along slippery reef. Keys had wrenched compass from its mountings before leaving the stricken vessel to steer their course over reef, half wading, half swimming. Keys was temporarily trapped in thick kelp when he fell into deep hole. Lacerated, bruised and shocked, they climbed steep cliff after several attempts, and after two hours, finally found their way to a house at Portsea. Vessel insured for 4,500 pounds. Valued at 6,000 pounds.
