Statement of significance

It was probably the mid to late eighties that a regular bay tourist trade really commenced. The giant pleasure steamers Ozone, Hygeina and Weeroona are probably the most famous vessels. These steamers carried thousands upon thousands of tourists and very soon became regular callers for people wanting to travel to Queenscliff, Sorrento, Portsea, Dromana, Rosebud, Rye and Mornington.

VHR history

Hygeina had a passenger capacity of 1600 and could manage a speed of 20 knots quite comfortably. Hygeia had magnificent lines. She was grey hulled with pink boot topping and buff funnels. Her engines produced some 4800 horse power. Hygeia carried their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York from Mornington on the eastern side of port Phillip Bay to St Kilda Pier, Melbourne on 6th May 1901 as part of their Royal visit.
