VHR history

Captain G Rudolph and Dr & amp; Mrs Casterton had retired for the night on board the Herald of the Morning which had arrived from Liverpool with some government immigrants (UID 9). The ship had been expressly built for the Australia run. The Captain was awakened by the cry "FIRE", and observed flames on board. Attempts to scuttle the ship were unsuccessful, as the burning of the cargo raised the ship in the water, rendering the holes cut in the side useless (UID 9). The tugs Sophia and Hercules towed the ship to the back beach between Sandridge and Williamstown where she continued to smolder (UID 152). The hulk was eventually removed and sunk at the end of Donaldsons jetty. Cargo and ship only partially insured. Cargo consisted of iron work for Hawthorne Bridge, subsequently sold at auction - became trusses for Mia Mia Bridge.
