## **VHR** history

The Ivy Florence was returning from a month long fishing trip to King Island. Had sheltered at Waratah Bay and Cowes. Due to tide and light head wind, was unable to enter the Bay and anchored Prince George Gas Buoy and West Channel Pile Light. At 11.15 pm, the outbound Leura struck Ivy Florence at anchor .<br/>
The Captain of the Leura went to the assistance of crew of ketch, picked up one survivor, the captain. After trying voyage he and crew were resting after seeing everything secure and anchor light burning brightly. Captain of Leura claimed he did not see any light on ketch. Steamer undamaged, continued on its way to Sydney, after delivering survivor to Queenscliff Lighthouse Superintendant who had gone to rescue. Bodies of the two crewmen recovered from wreck later. Wreck towed into shallower water (20 ft) towards Swan Island
