Taken from berth because of bad weather, touched bank off Point Richards and despite deck cargo being thrown overboard the waves made a breach over the ship & Damp; it filled almost immediately. Sank (UID 72, 1)

Statement of significance

The Jim is historically significant for its association with the Portarlington onion trade which was extremely prosperous

VHR history

Gilbert of Geelong was well-known as the owner for many years (ID 72). Jim taken from berth because of storm, touched bank off Point Richards, filled almost immediately, badly damaged. Deck cargo thrown overboard. Was being loaded at time of storm. Participated in the prosperous Portarlington onion trade. The Jim was grounded in same westerly gale as the Novelty and another unnamed vessel, a water tank [probably Sea Flower .
br /> Of the three vessels lost in the same gale, two were wrecked at Point Richards, three quarters of a mile to the west of the Portarlington Jetty; the third was wrecked on rocks a mile to the east. (ID 72)
