## **VHR history**

The Josephine foundered, filled and sank on 23rd April 1870. The crew of 2 men and a boy managed to get off just before the vessel sank in a howling SSW gale (UID 9). The wreck was buoyed but the government lightship Empire was towed to the wreck to attempt to raise the vessel. It was possibly raised after the sinking on 23 April -

as the last owners registered 9 May 1870 (ID 102) and Registry closed 9 Dec. 1880 with notation -'vessel wrecked some years ago in Port Phillip Bay'. The Register of ANZ Shipping carries notation - 'wrecked Hobson's Bay, n.d.' However, Williams and Serle (ID 52) claim it was blown up some time after the sinking. During 1869 carried wool from Geelong to Melbourne.
