#### Cause of loss

Deliberately beached on Swan Island. The generators were used to supply power to the military base on SwanIsland. Sunk as a breakwater

### Statement of significance

The J-3 is a unique visible maritime cultural feature in Port Phillip. Its location at Swan Island where its engines were used as electricity generators exhibits its defence associations and cultural re-use. it is one of the Royal Australian Navy's earliest submarines, predated only by the AE-1 and AE-2.

## **VHR** history

Double hull type Armament: one 3" Dp/Ha gun and one 2-pounder portable gun, later changed to a 4" quick firing gun mounted on a platform built before the bridge. 1J Class submarines built for British Navy. After World War I six subs offered to Australia as a gift. They saw little service with Australian Navy - an embarrassment from the beginning - in poor condition. Decision taken on 9 Nov. 1923 ( J-7 on 16 Jan. 1924) to scrap the subs. Remaining fittings of J-3 and hull of Countess of Hopetoun sold to Edward Hill for 1500 pounds. The hull of J-3 was to remain at Swan Island, where it had been towed by J-7.
