Statement of significance

<The Leeuwin is historically significant as one of only four wrecks of steamships in Victorian waters associated with the western district of Victoria's coastal steamship trade, along with the Casino, Coramba and Champion. It was built for this trade, and later served the Queensland and Western Australian coastal and mail trades before as the renamed Leeuwin, becoming a hulk and eventually scuttled in the Shipwreck Graveyard in Bass Strait. It is recreationally significant as one of the wrecks in Victoria's Ships Graveyard.</p>

VHR history

The Leeuwin was originally named the SS Julia Percy, and was built in Glasgow, Scotland for the Victorian western district steamship trade to the order of the Warrnambool Steam Packet Company. Ronald Parsons states

that, after being sold to Howard Smith in 1896:

"Howard Smith used the vessel in the Queensland coastal trades. Sold in 1903, the ship was transferred to Western Australia as her owner had obtained a local mail contract. In 1906 she was sold to Melbourne S.S. Co. and renamed Leeuwin, but continued in the Western Australian coastal run for some time until converted into a hulk in 1910, as a result of damage caused when she was driven against the jetty at Dongara during a gale."
