VHR history

The wooden brigantine Meg Merrilies was owned in Sydney for the first part of its career, and traded from that port to Melbourne with sundry cargoes. After being sold to Melbourne owners in 1853, it was employed in the trade across Bass Strait. On 23 May 1856 while carrying a cargo of coal from Tasmania to Port Albert, the vessel

was windbound and forced to anchor on Bentley's Harbour. When the wind shifted to the west, the captain decided to leave. Once under way, the wind dropped and the vessel drifted onto a sandbank. The crew attempted to kedge the vessel free, but when the tide rose, the surf began to break over the deck. The crew took to the rigging to escape the waves, while the crew from the schooner Eclipse attempted to rescue them. The captain, his wife, the cook and a boy were swept away and drowned. The mate and three others were saved.
