Grounded on bank in heavy seas. Attempts to refloat failed and ship eventually sank (UID 52)

Statement of significance

The Monarch is archaeologically significant as one of the most complete wooden wrecks in Victoria

VHR history

Purchased by E.M. Sayers, 1852, for Melbourne trade. Attempt to refloat vessel by steam tug Resolute failed. Seabird, close by, broke up about same time. Titan also failed in rescue attempt. Monarch's pumps unable to cope. Abandoned to underwriters. Remains auctioned for 350 pounds, then re-sold for 17 pounds cash. Registry closed 6 Aug. 1867.
