## Statement of significance

Significant as a mid ninteenth century international trader

#### VHR history

30 passengers and crew landed safely. Felt and yellow metalled 1852; part new keelson 1852; some repairs 1848, 1852; Lloyds classification A1 1852. Wreckers reportedly indulged in 'bacchanalian orgies' on plundered alcohol hidden in sand near wreck site. Entered Heads behind the Marie, both without a pilot. Pilots Ashby and Flood discharged for negligence in not attending to their duty. Later appealed to Board of Investigation - result not known. Vessel went to pieces twenty minutes after it struck, remains drifted up to South Channel and sank. Clear weather, ebb tide. Estimated loss 5,000 pounds. Corsair Rock first gazetted Nov. 1853. Ontario lost only 7 days after notice appeared.
