# **VHR** history

Originally a 3 masted barque the Confederate Star, renamed Palace in 1869. Arrived Melbourne 1874. Went to New Zealand in 1878. Returned to Melbourne in 1886 and made a lighter.<br/>
by /> cbr /> The PALACE and the BIRCHGROVE were owned and operated by the Port of Melbourne Authority. In February 1932 the vessels were towed out to sea by the tug KEERA for disposal. The vessels were set on fire but were carried shoreward by the wind and current and ran aground near the Nobbies.<br/>
by /> cbr /> Woodley states that the PALACE and BIRCHGROVE were condemned in Melbourne in the 1880s and adapted for use as lighters by Henry Moss (Victorian Lighterage Company P/L). After about 50 years service they became unusable and were taken out to sea and set on fire south of Phillip Island. However, the wind and tide caused the two vessels to drift ashore in the vicinity of the Nobbies where they quickly broke up.
