Statement of significance

Prince Albert is believed to be the first vessel wrecked at or near Port Phillip Heads. It went ashore after being battered by a heavy gale.

VHR history

Left Sydney 29 September; on a voyage to Melbourne where she was to be offered for sale. lost about mid-November. Believed to be the first vessel wrecked at or near Port Phillip Heads. Had put in at Westernport twice, the second time in company with a schooner, with which when the gale abated the Prince Albert again sailed out. The other vessel lost sight of it and the Prince Albert was not seen again. The remains of a man were later found on the Nepean shoreline and bags carrying mail for Melbourne were picked up at the Heads and forwarded to the Post Office.
