While loading a cargo of timber in Westernport Bay, the Western Australian-built brig River Chief was blown onto a reef by a gale and wrecked.
 "While this brig was lying at anchor at Western Port there were strong south east gales. Finding she was dragging her anchors, and nearing the reef, Captain W. H. James, at 10 pm, ordered her masts to be cut away. She seemed to hold on until 3:30, when she struck, knocking off her false keel, bilged and became a wreck. The vessel belonged to Captain Edward Lane of, Sydney, and was not insured. She was about one third laden with sawn and squared timber" (The Age 9 February 1858)
