VHR history

The iron barque Romeo, on a voyage from Hamburg to Sydney with a general cargo, ran ashore in fog near Ram Head. No lives were lost and some of the cargo was salvaged after it washed ashore. The crew rowed to Gabo Island from where they were taken on to Sydney. By the time a salvage vessel arrived at the site of the wreck, almost nothing was visible above water. At the subsequent Marine Board Inquiry in Sydney, it was found that the vessel had been lost through a wrongful act or default by Captain Berry in steering a course which led to the wreck when he was not sure of his position.
