VHR history

Rig listed as coal hulk 3 masts and 2 stumps One deck, elliptical stern, clincher built . Originally a steam collier owned by Bellambie Coal Co and traded between Newcastle and Sydney. Converted to a hulk in 1914. WERFA was sunk at her berth in Victoria Dock in August 1925 when struck by a departing American destroyer the U.S. MacDonough. The lighter had a cargo of 480 tons of coal and was salvaged along with the vessel, this was succesfully achieved by the building of a coffer-dam around her open hatches and the water being pumped out. The WERFA was scuttled outside the Port Phillip Heads on March 21 1929.
