Statement of significance

The wreck is significant socially for its use as a landing stage for the popular Bellarine Tea Gardens. It is difficult to assess archaeological significance due to the structure being modified throughout its career, however the site has not been inspected.

VHR history

Moved further inshore to 1/4 mile west of hulk of City of Melbourne, in 9 ft of water. A former barque, after rebuilding from wreck of the ship, New Great Britain. Hulk occasionally used as landing stage for popular Bellarine Tea Gardens, with passengers being picked up by paddle steamer Bellarine. On return journey picked up by Bay steamer, Edina from Geelong. 4 In 1876 traded between Melbourne and Geelong. Blasting took place in 1907 on an old hulk near Point Henry, presumably either the Briton or the City of Melbourne. Selective research only reveals that between 1877 and 1882 Briton was used as a lighter around Melbourne.
