### Statement of significance

The vessel is significant socially for its transportation of passengers around the Australian coast. As it has not yet been inspected it is difficult to assess archaeological significance.

### **VHR** history

After a career spanning more than 40 years, the interstate steamer Buninyong was withdrawn from service, stripped of fittings and scuttled in the Ships' Graveyard. The vessel was originally built for Howard Smith Ltd, and carried passengers and cargo around the Australian coast.
